Estimates differ from the CBO estimate of aggregate spending because they do not include the effects of applying the FMAP increase to IV-E payments and may use differing projections of state unemployment. The amount of federal Medicaid funding increases provided to states may differ based on actual unemployment rate increases in individual states over time.
